CONTEXT AND BACKGROUND

- ☐ About 47 percent of the population is below the age of 18.
- ☐ Children and young people will be impacted by all SDGs goals
- ☐ The presentation is focused on the following goals-
 - No Poverty (1)
 - Quality Education (4)
 - Gender Equality (5)
 - Decent Work (8)
 - Peace and Justice (16)
- ☐ A key commitment "Leave No One Behind"
- ☐ Ethnicity, race, gender, age, disability...
- ☐ Children are one broad group under LNOB framework
- ☐ Children are also one of the most heterogeneous groups





































METHODOLOGY

- ☐ Focus on Children who are excluded or at risk of exclusion
 ☐ Secondary sources of data
 ☐ Eight FGD with children with diverse situation
- ☐ 113 children participated
 - Adolescent girls
 - Working Girls and boys
 - Girls and boys in disaster prone area
 - Plain Land Adivasi children
 - Girls and boys with disabilities
 - Girls of hard to reach area

No Poverty

☐ Among the children, different marginalized groups are covered by the safety net program

Type of children	Current FY	Starting year	children at the beginning	
Children with disabilities	100000	2007-8	12209	
Transgender children	1247	2012-13	135	
Children of beday community	4000	2012-13	875	
Children of Dalit and other marginalized group	21900			

- ☐ Allocation is increased significantly
- Stipend have a significant impact on the life of the children
- ☐ Lack of accountability in the beneficiary selection process
- ☐ The gap of authentic data is a major barrier for all





































Quality Education

■ Significant progress in increasing enrolment rate
☐ National Focus: Completion
☐ SDGs Focus: learning outcome
☐ Bangla reading proficiency 54%
☐ English reading proficiency 19% Alarming!
☐ Mathematics proficiency 57%
☐ Gross and Net Enrolment Rate in Primary education increased
☐ Dropout rate of girl at the secondary level is still very high
☐ 18.9% children are attending ECD which was 13.4% in 2013.
☐ 77.4% children are attending one year preprimary education
☐ Preprimary education to be for two years.





































Quality Education

Stipends for 100,000 students with disabilities
nadequate inclusive teaching learning pedagogy
Accessibility and transportation
Addressed in the foundation training of primary teachers
Dalit children face class based discrimination
28.5% of the Dalit children remain out of enrollment.
58% of the Dalit children drop out
Dalits girls to manage household responsibilities.
Child Marriage is very common among Dalit







































Quality Education

Children of sex workers have limited access to education
Identity makes it stressful to continue going to school
Girls face sexual harassment and are at risk of trafficking
Children of beday community mostly do not go to the School
The school dropout rate among the ethnic children 33%
Children in Tea garden have limited opportunity of education
Family tradition to become garden worker
Many children stay at home to take care of their siblings
Poverty and parent's awareness is common issue for all group

☐ Different forms of violence against girls strongly exists

☐ Child marriage is decreased

Proportion of women aged 20-24 years who were married or in a union	2012-13	2019	
(a) before age 15	18.1	15.5	
(b) before age 18	52.3	51.4	

- ☐ Beday Girls got married by the age of 13/14
- \Box In urban slums 30% girls become mother by the age of 15-19.
- The rate is 13% outside the slum area
- ☐ 15-20 thousands children work in the street as sex workers







































Gender Equality

- Marshal Art for girls becoming popular
- Helps to be physically and mentally stronger
- ☐ Boost selfconfidence
- Helps to be disciplined
- Contribute to stop child marriage











































Decent Work

- ☐ 6.8% of children age 5-17 years are involved in child labour
- ☐ Approximately 3.45 million working children
- ☐ 1.28 million are engaged in hazardous work
- ☐ The Bangladeshi society as a whole accept child labour
- ☐ Exposed to various forms of mental, physical and moral abuse and exploitations







































Peace and Justice

- ☐ Physical punishment and/or psychological aggression
- 88.8 percent in 2019
- ☐ 82.3 percent in 2013
- ☐ Lack of comprehensive and updated database
- ☐ Calling a child offensive names is psychological aggression
- ☐ This is common for children with disabilities

☐ Invest in children benefits of the demographic dividend
☐ Strengthen systems and build structures and capacities
☐ Priority to address the data gap
☐ Enact anti-discrimination law
☐ Inclusive primary and secondary education
☐ Technical and vocational education facility
☐ Strengthen the reporting and response mechanism
☐ Introduce Marshal Art for girls in secondary education






























